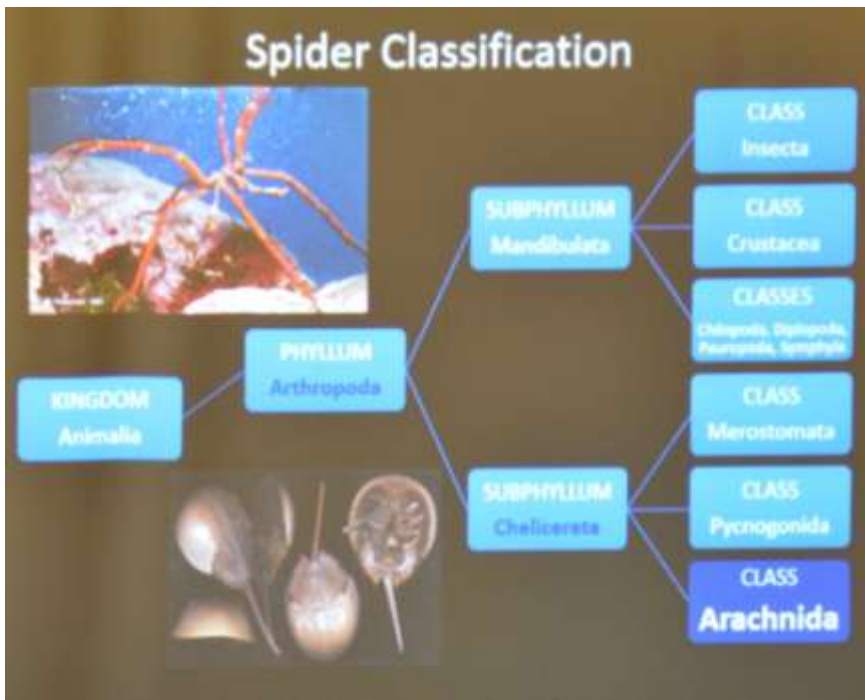

43,000 species worldwide

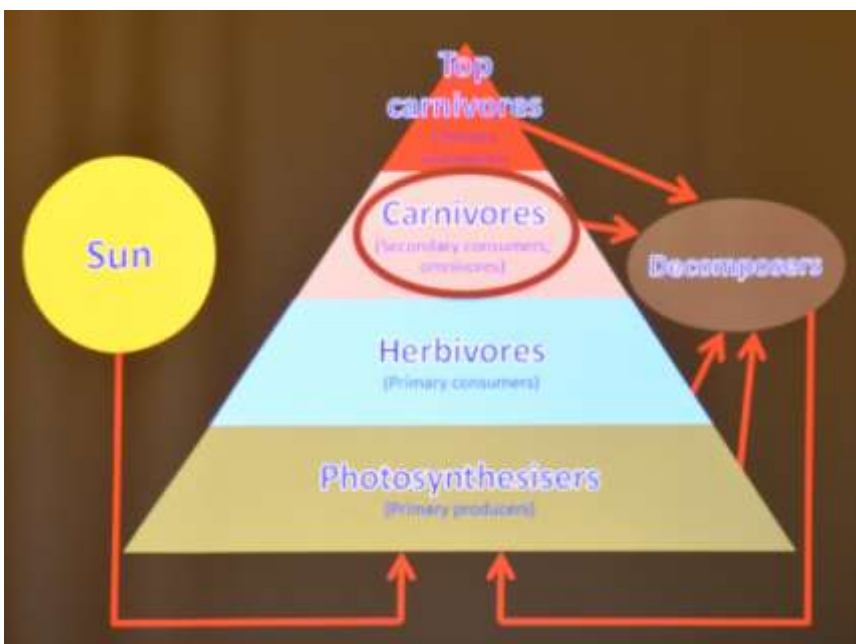
645 species in UK (33 families)

Imogen gave us many facts and figures on spiders. Where they fit in the food chain, the more common types found and where, how they can disguise themselves to their surroundings, their life cycles, how they get about. You are not even safe from spiders underwater! They can be identified by the type of web they spin.



Some spiders jump, some hide from their prey, some are able to “fly”. Luckily here in the UK most spiders are harmless and many of them are very small money spiders and do not frighten Denise all that much?? They live quite happily in our houses and are often beneficial to us keeping down the fly population. (Oh yeah!!)

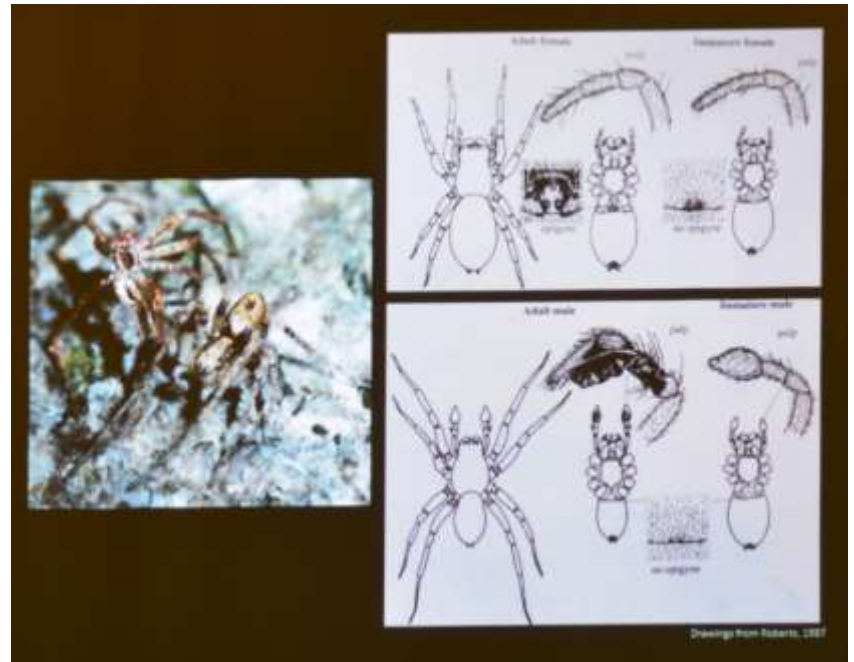

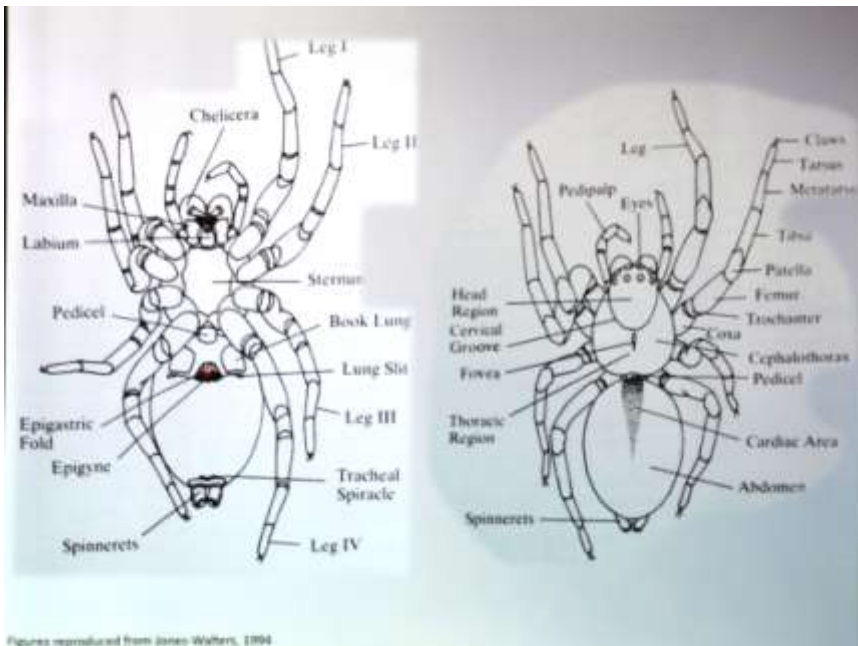

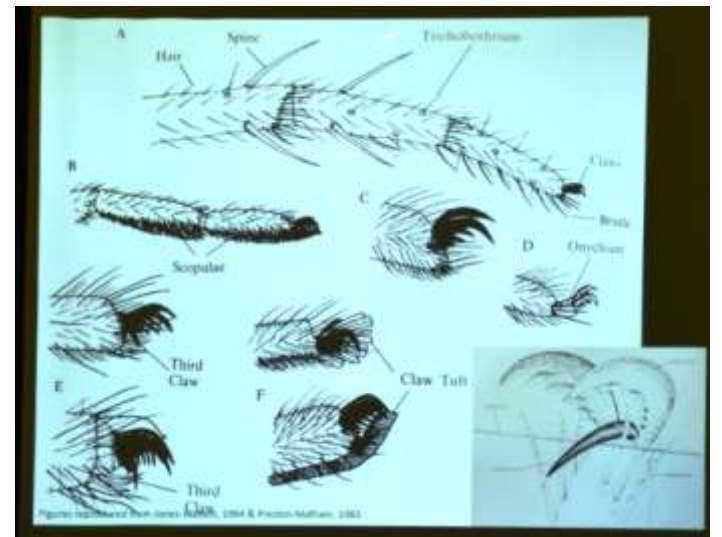
Lynx spider,

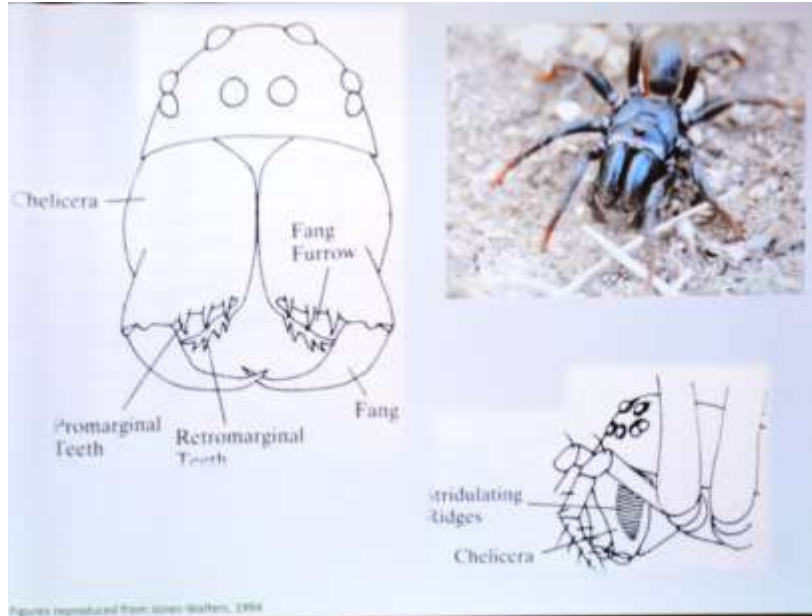

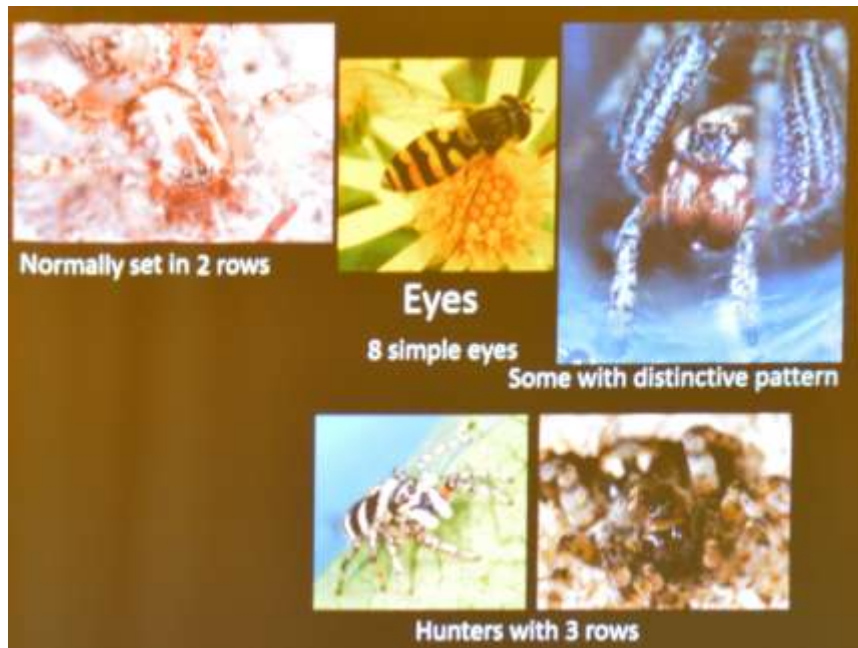
In part 2 of the talk we looked at the various parts of the spider's body to aid identification.
